




Total <u>Students</u> Experiencing Restraint & Seclusion




Incident Breakdown by Students with an IEP, Section 504 Plan, or Neither




Average Age Representation




ESI Breakdown by Percent of Ethnic Population




ESI Incident Breakdown by Gender
